RECORD FUNDING IN SCOTLAND

The Scottish Government has increased the active travel budget in Scotland to at least £189m for the year from April. This represents a £39m boost. For the first time, spending on cycling, walking and wheeling will be more than 5% of Scotland's transport budget. It's a welcome investment in active travel at a time when governments are beset by financial pressures.



CODE UNREAD

t's a year since the new Highway Code came into force on 29 January 2022. Its raft of hard-won changes should have made our roads safer for everyone, especially for vulnerable road users - pedestrians, horse riders and cyclists.

The new rules were the result of 10 years of campaigning by Cycling UK, and wouldn't have been possible without your support. But changing the Code was just half the battle; changing driving habits is the crucial next step.

We made this clear to the

Department for Transport. We did our bit, producing videos and guidance to help drivers, cyclists and pedestrians understand the new rules. Yet we can't reach 65 million road users alone. That's the role of Government.

With no long-term education campaign forthcoming, it's unsurprising, though disappointing, that many road users remain unfamiliar with the updated rules around junctions, overtaking, and the Dutch Reach. Some tentative but positive first steps emerged last summer when THINK!

called on the public to 'travel like you know them'. It avoided the victim-blaming pitfalls of some of the road safety organisation's previous campaigns.

Much more still needs to be done to raise awareness of the new rules. Cycling UK is therefore renewing its call on the Department for Transport to fund a longterm educational campaign to ensure all road users understand the new Highway Code, so that our roads are safer in practice and not just in theory.
