HIGHWAY CODE OVERHAUL

The rules are being rewritten to improve the safety of vulnerable road users such as cyclists, as **Keir Gallagher** explains

ast summer 16,500 people supported
Cycling UK's response to the
Government's Highway Code Review,
making it one of our best supported
campaigns ever. The Department for
Transport [DfT] listened: it has committed to
incorporate the key revisions we called for.

We've been pushing for changes in the Highway Code for years, and in 2018 the Government agreed a review was necessary. Since then, we've worked closely with the DfT and active travel experts to propose changes to the Code to better protect people cycling and walking. This early engagement paid dividends: when the review was launched, a really positive set of revisions was put forward for consultation. They included:

- The introduction of a hierarchy of responsibility.
- Simplification of the rules relating to nonsignalised junctions to tackle 'left-hook' collisions.
- New rules to tackle close passes, with a guideline minimum safe passing distance.
- The inclusion of the Dutch Reach, to help prevent car-dooring.

These proposals represent a significant step forward for road safety. They build on Cycling

UK's long-running work to tackle close passing and car-dooring, while ensuring that the Code would recognise, for the first time, that those driving more dangerous vehicles carry a greater responsibility to protect others' safety.

When the Highway Code Review was launched, we set out the case for making these changes. This is where you, our members and supporters, played a vital part: of the 21,000 individuals and organisations who responded to the Government review, 80% [16,500] did so in support of Cycling UK's requests. This overwhelming support means the DfT has public backing to push ahead with the proposals, which they've now committed to doing. It's a big win for cyclist and pedestrian

There's still plenty to be done to ensure the rules changes make a difference on the road. That's why we're calling on the Government to launch a wide-reaching and well communicated public awareness campaign to explain the new rules to all road users, and help the public understand why they matter. But for now, it's also important to celebrate a well-earned campaign win, which we would never have achieved without your support. Thank you, once again.

The Court of Appeal has granted Cycling UK permission to pursue our judicial review against the council in West Sussex for removing the cycle lane in Shoreham. The trips were famed for taking members on adventures of a lifetime, whether through the leafy lanes of the home counties to far flung destinations in the 'stans. The tours covered the broad breadth of abilities and interests of our membership, for the simple reason that they were led by our members, as volunteer tour managers, for our members.

When CTC H&T started 20 years ago, no other travel organisation was able to match or provide that breadth of service and experience our members wanted and expected. And how could they?

Through CTC H&T, participants were drawing on the knowledge of enthusiastic world travellers who were in it not for profit, but rather the opportunity to share that passion of adventure and unique view of the world which comes from the saddle. That's hard to match for a commercial enterprise.

On tour, lifetime friendships began and romance frequently blossomed. CTC H&T's

popularity grew among the membership as, until relatively recently, if you wanted a cycling holiday, either home or abroad, led by experts in their field – you joined a CTC H&T.

Not all good things can last forever, sadly. In recent years, the earlier, more popular days of CTC H&T have been impossible to match. The result is that, from October, this chapter in our charity's history will draw to a close. This autumn, CTC H&T ceases trading.

Janet Atherton, chair of Cycling UK's board of trustees, said: "CTC Holidays and Tours will be forever fondly recalled in the long annals of Cycling UK's history. The board and the charity would like to put on record our thanks to all the tour leaders who gave so freely of their time and expertise, the directors of the company, and above all everyone who took part in the tours themselves."

Thousands of tourers have travelled the six cyclable continents during the last 20 years thanks to CTC H&T. Many of those travellers, will be reading this right now – and we'd love it if you could help to preserve the legacy of CTC H&T by writing up journeys past for Cycle's Travellers' Tales (see p73).

GREEN GROWTH FOR CYCLING

A power-sharing deal has been reached to bring Green MSPs into the Scottish Government and has led to a boost for cycling in the new Programme for Government. A commitment to triple active travel funding to 10% of the transport budget meets our Cycling UK Scottish election manifesto funding ask. Scottish Greens co-leader Patrick Harvie MSP has been appointed as Active Travel Minister (a first for the UK) with the task of turning policies into action.
